Thinking they could change the "plain old white fireplace" in the living room without a great deal of work, the Beasleys removed the fireplace mantle. "But the whole thing just

fell apart," Marge says.

That turned out to be a blessing in disguise. Working almost from scratch, the Beasleys converted the fireplace to gas logs and added a mahogany mantle with a black, gray and white Uba Tuba granite base. Liking the mahogany fireplace so well, Marge decided to put mahogany cabinets in the kitchen.

And so it started.

By the time they finished, the Beasleys had almost tripled the size of their new home. Starting with a 2,700-square-foot house, they added 4,500 more square feet for a total of 7,200 square feet.

"That is more than twice the size of our house in Hoosier Acres," Marge says. "The plan just kept on growing. Our intention was not to do this but one thing led to another. Suddenly, our downsizing wasn't small at all ... Oops!"

Since they were making such drastic changes to the 4-year-old house they had bought, the Beasleys decided to go ahead and create their dream place. That meant plenty of open living space, walk-in his and her closets, another two-car plus garage, storage galore, an exercise room, a room-sized

> shower with multi-angle water nozzles, and a master bedroom and bathroom with "Wow!" power.

That's exactly what they got. With the help of Larry Routen at Lifestyle Kitchens and Baths, Betty Applegate at Gateway Interiors and other experts, the home has been lovingly finished. It is also just a short 10-minute or so drive from work. Charles is owner of Beasley

Food Service. Marge is Director of Environmental Services at Bloomington Hospital.

"Marge has exquisite taste," says Larry Routen. "I just listened to what she wanted and helped her put it on paper so it could become reality."

The project expanded the house up and down and out. It now has a basement, second floor, back

A well-lit storage area as big as two rooms in the upstairs provides plenty of space for keeping things. "Before I had to crawl around under the eaves with a flashlight," Marge says. "I really wanted a storage area that I could use."


is topped by a built-in television. In one corner, a little snack nook designed by Larry has a microwave oven and a small refrigerator and sink.




"I fell in love with it but when I went to get it, it was gone," Marge recalls. "They said they didn't have any more and couldn't get any more."
